PERSONS TO BE HEARD

Marjy Wood, 103 5th Ave., spoke to Agenda Item 13b, Sale of City Tidelands to Bill and Cheryl Goodale. Ms. Wood stated that she was a primary user of the Vendor Shelter Area; stated that she met with Harbormaster Meissner and that she was in favor of the proposal to construct a new area south of the pavement and the barge for a new staging area; stated that she was in favor of this proposal. Ms. Wood also said that she believed that the Goodale plan is a good one and that she supports it, just as long as the City creates an alternate staging area.

Wilma Leslie, 326 First Ave., spoke in favor of the Assembly sending a letter to the Governor, asking him to reinstate the Alaska Marine Highway System funding.

RE: New staging area at City Dock

Dear Mayor Jack and Council Members:

Thank you for your consideration and cooperation in providing an alternative borough owned staging area for businesses providing tours to cruise ships calling on the port of Wrangell. I am grateful that there is designated grant money to help build this structure. The positive economic impact from cruise ship visits is significant. They are a very important component to the commerce of Wrangell.

City government providing public owned staging areas for businesses serving the cruise ship sector of the visitor industry is standard practice. In fact, many cities expand their public port facilities in order to attract more cruise ships to their communities. The building of these staging areas and covered shelters are actions of economic development.

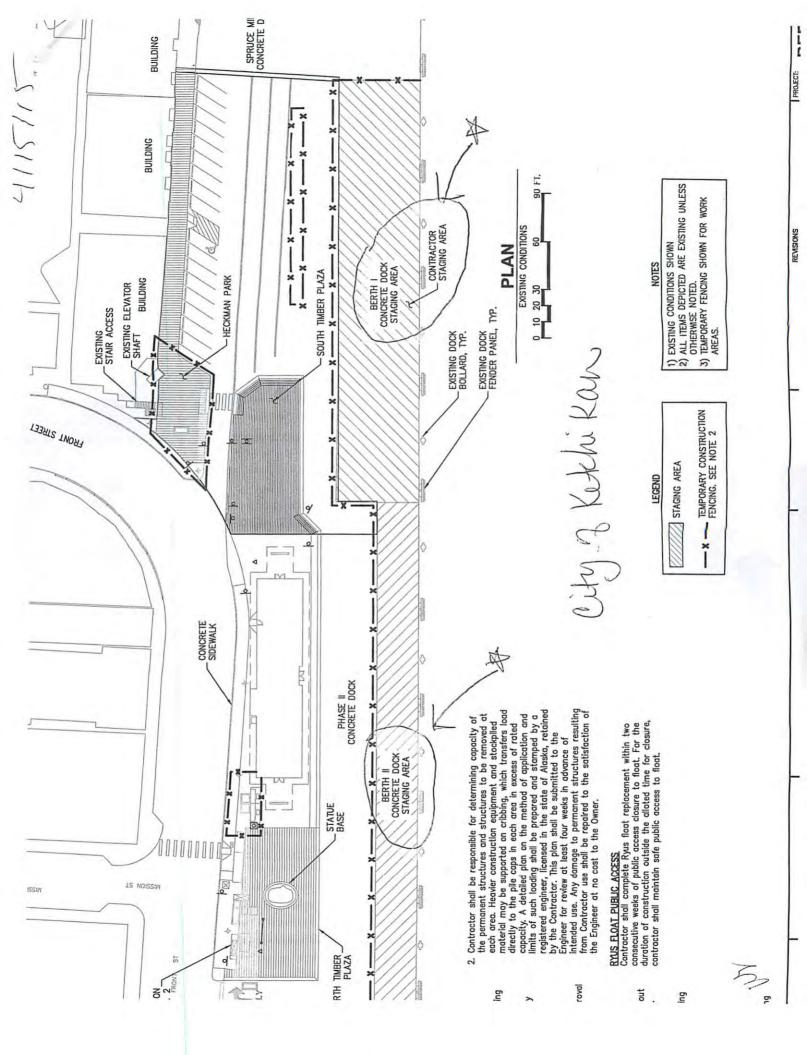

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QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Question

I wanted to know if they are planning any upland development with this bond issue for the downtown. In the 2003 proposal, it was listed. Downtown is in need of sidewalk repairs and widening, benches and added restrooms.

Answer

Upland improvements are a significant component to the proposed project. For pedestrians, a promenade will be constructed from Schoenbar Road to Dock Street to allow for safe passage along the waterfront for visitors, residents and harbor users. A covered pedestrian shelter and restroom facility are also planned. PN&D Consulting Engineers, the firm that is spearheading the design for the port rehabilitation project, is working with Kittelson & Associates on a pedestrian and traffic flow plan, signage and other amenities for the project area.

Some sidewalk widening is already under consideration. The City is currently discussing the issue with the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities, along with the City's desire to use a 2004 \$1 million federal earmark for this purpose. The Ketchikan City Council approved a design contract with PN&D Consulting Engineers for sidewalk widening on Water Street at its April 6, 2006 meeting. If there is sufficient funding available, the City will also address relocating overhead electrical utilities to underground and potentially adding other sidewalk improvements on the south side of the tunnel.

Bus staging adjacent to Sockeye Sam's will be relocated from its current on-street location to an over-the-water area near Tongass Trading Company. This will assist in alleviating congestion near the tunnel and keeping visitors from straying on to Tongass Avenue.

A Request for Proposals for a parking garage (click here) is also being advertised. This Main Street Parking Garage would simultaneously assist with parking congestion and support a future library.

1. PORT OF KEICHIKAN WATERFRONT RECONFIGURATION

Question

I am wondering how much the pedestrian access infrastructure will be improved in Ketchikan to accompany and facilitate the increased number of passengers that will disembark here.

My fear is that the only onshore improvements that will happen will be in the area immediately in front of the new dock. If improvements are not made to the rest of the infrastructure the overall result will be a worsening of the pedestrian and car traffic congestion that already exists in Ketchikan.

Specifically, will:

- The sidewalks be widened to at least double their present width from the area around the Lutheran Church to Saxman?
- A multi-level parking garage be added to handle the parking now used on streets that will be used in the future for pedestrian traffic?
- A revised traffic system that will divert car traffic a block or so inshore of the present Tongass Ave/Water Street?

PN&D Consulting Engineers, the firm that is spearheading the design for the port rehabilitation project, is working with Kittelson & Associates on a pedestrian and vehicle traffic flow plan, signage and other amenities in both the downtown and Newtown areas. The company is in the process of finalizing a report that will propose recommendations for improving tour bus circulation; pedestrian facility improvements such as new or widened sidewalks, traffic signalization, crosswalks, curb extensions, etc. A comprehensive directional signage program is also being developed. The City anticipates that the report will be received shortly. Any recommendations that are adopted by the City Council will be implemented concurrently with the proposed Port project.

Upland improvements are already a significant component of the planned capital improvements. For pedestrians, a promenade will be constructed from Schoenbar Road to Dock Street to allow for safe passage along the waterfront for visitors, residents and harbor users. A covered pedestrian shelter and restroom facility are also proposed.

ALASKA OPEN MEETINGS ACT

• **General rule:** "All meetings of a governmental body of a public entity of the state are open to the public except as otherwise provided by this section or another provision of law." AS 44.62.310(a)

• Where do I find the Alaska Open Meetings Act (OMA)?

The OMA is in the Alaska Statutes at AS 44.62.310 - 312. A copy of the statute follows this outline.

• Does the OMA apply to local governments?

Yes. Under AS 29.20.020, "meetings of all municipal bodies shall be public as provided in AS 44.62.310." The term "public entity" in the OMA includes municipalities.

• Do the Wrangell Charter and Wrangell Municipal Code have provisions on open meetings that also apply?

Yes. Section 2-7 of the Charter provides: "All meetings of the assembly shall be open to the public, and the public shall have a reasonable opportunity to be heard." WMC 3.04.090(H) sets out this same provision for regular and special meetings of the Assembly. WMC 3.04.120 sets out the rules on executive sessions (see below).

• What does the OMA require and how is it interpreted?

The OMA sets out the state policy on meetings of governmental bodies in AS 44.62.312. This section provides that it is the intent of the law that actions of governmental bodies "be taken openly and that their deliberations be conducted openly." Exceptions are required to be "construed narrowly" to avoid exemptions from open meeting requirements. The OMA is interpreted broadly and in favor of open public process by state and local governmental bodies.

You should presume that all meetings of the Assembly, the various municipal boards and commissions, and committees of these bodies are required to be open to the public. The OMA covers situations where the governmental body is engaged in fact gathering, investigation, discussion, and deliberation, whether formal or informal, and regardless of whether a decision is made.

In addition, the public has a right to know how the members vote. Except for votes taken to organize the body, such as a vote to elect a chair, voting must "conducted in such a manner that the public may know the vote of each person entitled to vote." AS 44.62.310(a).

• What is a "governmental body"?

This term is defined in AS 44.62.310(h)(1) to mean "an assembly, council, board commission, committee, or other similar body of a public entity with the authority to establish policies or make decisions for the public entity or with the authority to advise or make recommendations to the public entity; 'governmental body' includes the members of a subcommittee or other subordinate unit of a governmental body if the subordinate unit consists of two or more members."

• What is a "meeting" and how many members constitute a "meeting"?

"Meeting" is defined in AS 44.62.310(h)(2). The definition has two standards for how many members of a governmental body constitute a meeting: one for bodies that have authority to establish policies or make decisions, and another for bodies that have only authority to advise or make recommendations for a public entity:

- 1. For policy and decision-making bodies, a "meeting" means a gathering of members when more than three members or a majority of the members, whichever is less, are present, and they collectively consider a matter upon which the body is empowered to act.
- 2. For advisory/recommendations only bodies, a "meeting" means a gathering of members when more than three members or a majority of the members, whichever is less, are present, and the gathering is prearranged for the purpose of considering a matter upon which the body is empowered to act.

The Alaska Supreme Court has held: a "meeting" includes every step of the deliberative and decision-making process when a governmental unit meets to transact public business.

• What are the public notice requirements for a meeting?

The OMA requires that "**reasonable public notice**" be given for all meetings required to be open. AS 44.62.310(e). Usually the municipal clerk or board staff is tasked with providing public notice of meetings. The notice must include the date, time, and place of the meeting and may be given using print or broadcast media, and posted at city hall. The notice requirements for regular and special meetings of the Wrangell Assembly are set out in WMC 3.04.080 and 090. A body should provide notice in a consistent fashion for all its meetings. The Alaska Supreme Court has stated: "We encourage government bodies to provide notice of hearings and meetings through a variety of the means authorized in the Open Meetings Act". *Gold Country Estates Preservation Group, Inc. v. Fairbanks North Star Borough*, 270 P.3d 787, 797 (Alaska 2012).

• Can we hold a site visit under the OMA? Is a site visit a "meeting"?

Yes, a governmental body may schedule and hold a site visit. A site visit is a "meeting" under the OMA that must be properly noticed. This was an issue in the *Gold Country Estates* case, in which the borough platting board held a site visit of a proposed variance location. Notice of the site visit was published in the newspaper and on the borough's website. The court held that the site visit was a "meeting" for purposes of the OMA, stating: "the information-gathering and discussion at the site visit constituted collective consideration of 'a matter on which the governmental body [was] empowered to act' and a key step in the deliberative and decision-making process…" 270 P.3d at page 796. The court also found that the borough provided adequate notice of the site visit under the facts of the case.

• What about teleconferencing?

A meeting may be held by teleconference, and participation by members of the body or the public may be by teleconferencing. If a meeting is to be held by teleconference, the notice should include any teleconference location and materials to be considered should be available at the teleconference site if practicable.

A member may need to call into a meeting due to travel or otherwise being unable to attend in person, and that circumstance does not turn the meeting into a meeting by teleconference but the member calling in should have access to the meeting materials. WMC 3.05.050 sets out the rules on participation by teleconference by assembly members in meetings of the Assembly.

• Can we hold an executive session?

Yes, under the OMA a governmental body is allowed to discuss certain subjects in executive session. The law sets out the specific subjects that may be considered in executive session in AS 44.62.310(c). AS 44.62.310(b) sets out the procedure that must be followed for a body to convene in an executive session. These provisions are also in the WMC 3.04.120, the code section on executive sessions held by the Assembly.

• How do we call an executive session?

The meeting must first be convened as a public meeting. The question of holding an executive session to discuss one of the allowed subjects must be decided by majority vote of the body. The motion "**must clearly and with specificity describe the subject of the proposed executive session without defeating the purpose of addressing the subject in private.**" AS 44.62.310(b); WMC 3.04.120. You will need to strike a reasonable balance here. The motion should generally state the topics to be discussed and invoke one or more of the allowed subjects for executive session, but without so much detail as to defeat the purpose of discussing the topics in executive session.

• What subjects are proper for executive session?

The subjects that may be considered in executive session are:

- 1. Matters, the immediate knowledge of which would clearly have an adverse effect upon the finances of the public entity;
- 2. Subjects that tend to prejudice the reputation and character of any person, provided the person may request a public discussion;
- 3. Matters which by law, municipal charter, or ordinance are required to be confidential;
- 4. Matters involving consideration of governmental records that by law are not subject to public disclosure.

These subjects are listed in AS 44.62.310(c) and WMC 3.04.120.

• What can be done in executive session?

Once in executive session, you are only allowed to consider those subjects mentioned in the motion calling for the session "unless auxiliary to the main question" (subsidiary or supplemental to the main subject, or of assistance or help in its consideration). No action may be taken in executive session, and final action should not be taken until the body is back in open session, with the exception that under the OMA the body may in executive session give direction to an attorney or a labor negotiator regarding the handling of a specific legal matter or pending labor negotiation. AS 44.62.310(b); WMC 3.04.120. Executive sessions are not permitted to be recorded. WMC 3.04.120.

• What do we do when we come out of executive session?

At the conclusion of the executive session, the body should reconvene in public session. This is the point at which action may be taken. For example, the body may direct the manager to proceed in accordance with direction as discussed in executive session. There may be times when the body can give a full public report, such as when there is no further need for confidentiality. There will also be times when no action is to be taken, such as when the session was a status report on a legal matter, in which case the body may reconvene and move on to the next agenda item. Even if no action is to be taken, the body must reconvene in open session to adjourn the meeting.

• Are meetings ever exempt from the OMA?

Yes, there are specific exemptions listed in AS 44.62.310(d). The exemptions relevant to municipal government are:

- 1. A governmental body performing a quasi-judicial function when holding a meeting solely to make a decision in an adjudicatory matter. For example, when a governing body sitting as a board of appeals has heard an appeal from a planning commission decision and holds a meeting to deliberate on and decide the appeal;
- 2. Meetings of a hospital medical staff;
- 3. Meetings of the governmental body or any committee of a hospital when holding a meeting solely to act upon matters of professional qualifications, privileges, or discipline;
- 4. Staff meetings or other gatherings of the employees of a public entity;
- 5. Meetings held for the purpose of participating in or attending a gathering of a national, state, or regional organization of which the municipality, body, or member of the body, is a member, but only if no action is taken and no business of the governmental body is conducted at the meetings;
- 6. Meetings of municipal service area boards when meeting solely to act on matters that are administrative or managerial in nature.

• What happens if the OMA is violated?

Any action taken by a body in violation of the OMA can be made void by a court. It is also possible for a governmental body to cure a violation or alleged violation by holding another meeting to undertake "substantial reconsideration" of the subject discussed or decided upon at a meeting held in violation of the OMA.

• When in doubt, ask for help!

If you have questions about the propriety of a meeting, OMA procedures, executive sessions, meeting notice, or what the law may require in a particular situation, you should contact the municipal clerk, manager, mayor, or other municipal official working with the governmental body, as they have considerable experience with the public meeting process. If necessary they can consult with the borough attorney to get legal advice and assistance on the questions.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, AMENDING SECTION 5.22.030, ENHANCED 911 SURCHARGE ON LOCAL EXCHANGE ACCESS LINES AND WIRELESS TELEPHONE NUMBERS, OF THE WRANGELL MUNICIPAL CODE TO INCREASE THE MONTHLY SURCHARGE WITHIN THE ENHANCED 911 SERVICE AREA

WHEREAS, the City and Borough of Wrangell provides an enhanced 911 system within the enhanced 911 service area of the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the system promotes a more efficient public safety response by helping to identify the location of emergencies following a 911 call from within the service area; and

WHEREAS, under Alaska law, AS 29.35.131, a municipality providing an enhanced 911 system may impose an enhanced 911 surcharge of up to \$2.00 per month within the 911 service area for each wireless telephone number and each local exchange access number in order to support and fund the system; and

WHEREAS, the current monthly surcharge of \$.75 was put in place effective January 1, 2005 and has not been increased since that time; and

WHEREAS, under WMC 5.22.060, the Assembly is required to review the surcharge annually to determine whether the amount is adequate, excessive or insufficient to meet anticipated enhanced 911 system needs; and

WHEREAS, the Assembly has reviewed the current surcharge and has determined that it is not sufficient to meet the anticipated needs of the system and therefore should be increased as provided in this ordinance. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA:

SEC. 2. <u>Amendment</u>. Section 5.22.030 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

5.22.030 Enhanced 911 surcharge on local exchange access lines and wireless telephone numbers.

Beginning with the first billing for any telephone services rendered on [January 1, 2005] July 1, 2015, and each month thereafter, there is imposed a surcharge of [0.75]2.00 per month for each local exchange access line for wireline telephones and for each wireless telephone number within the enhanced 911 service area. The surcharge shall apply to all such wireline and wireless telephones, even those serving government agencies and nonprofit organizations. The amount of the surcharge imposed is subject to review and determination by the assembly pursuant to WMC 5.22.060.

DATE: April 8, 2015

BACKGROUND:

The monthly charge for 911 support on each phone in Wrangell has not changed since January 1^{st} , 2005, or ten years. As you probably know, the State is in a financial crisis and continues to make cuts that affect municipalities and others. One of those cuts that has happened is the 60% cut to our community jail. That cut is \$352,000. The dispatchers funded for the jail also handle the 911 dispatch. Without this funding, it is not only hard to keep the jail open, but also will be hard to fund the 911 dispatch service provided.

Currently, the monthly phone charge for 911 services is \$0.75 per phone per month. This raises about \$13,500 annually. We are proposing to raise this amount to \$2.00 per phone per month. This would add about \$22,500 of new revenue to help offset at least some of the costs. \$2.00 is the maximum amount that can be charged per state statutes without a vote of the people in the community providing the 911 services. Obviously, this is not going to bridge the gap of what is lost in state revenue for the jail, but this and other things we are doing together will resolve this for at least one more year as we look at possibly other options to resolve this as continued cuts happen in future years. If approved, this ordinance would become effective on July 1, 2015.

Again, we will be looking at every user based thing we do to up the user fees so that property taxes can stay stable. Public safety and the 911 system is important and I think the increase is a small amount annually to each phone user to help keep this service.

Recommended Action:

Move to approve first reading and move to a second with a Public Hearing to be held on April 28, 2015.

WHEREAS, on December 10, 2013, the Wrangell Borough Assembly adopted Resolution No. 12-13-1290 recommending that the Operations and Maintenance of the Tyee Hydroelectric Project be transferred from the Thomas Bay Power Authority (TBPA) to the Southeast Alaska Power Agency (SEAPA); and

WHEREAS, on July 24, 2014, the Assignment and Assumption Agreement was executed by SEAPA, the City and Borough of Petersburg, and the City and Borough of Wrangell, transferring the Operations and Maintenance of the Tyee Hydroelectric Project from the TBPA to the SEAPA; and

WHEREAS, on January 27, 2015, the Wrangell Borough Assembly adopted Ordinance No. 890 amending Chapter 3.40 of the Wrangell Municipal Code, to rename the Thomas Bay Power Commission to be the Thomas Bay Power Advisory Committee, and establish the purpose and duties of the Advisory Committee; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the transfer of the operations and maintenance of the Tyee Hydroelectric Project to the SEAPA and the establishment of the Thomas Bay Power Advisory Committee, the TBPC is no longer required or needed, and therefore the Assembly is proposing this Charter amendment to repeal Section 11-2, Thomas Bay Power Authority;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA:

[The changes to the existing Home Rule Charter are shown as follows: the words that are <u>underlined are to be added</u> and the words that are **[bolded and in brackets are to be deleted]**.]

SEC. 1. <u>Classification</u>. This ordinance is of a permanent nature and, if approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting on the proposition set forth in Section 4, shall become a part of the Home Rule Charter of the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska.

SEC. 2. <u>Charter Amendment</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to repeal Section 11-2, Thomas Bay Power Authority, of the Wrangell Home Rule Charter, as follows:

Section 11-2 Repealed [Thomas Bay Power Authority.]

[There is a Thomas Bay Power Authority, owned jointly and equally by the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska, and the City of Petersburg, Alaska, which exists for the purpose of constructing and operating a hydro-electric power generating utility. Said authority shall have all express, implied and incidental powers thereto, including but not limited to acquiring extra-territorial properties, and obtaining financing and the issuance of revenue bonds in its own name, and said authority may incorporate or otherwise reorganize as a separate entity, but in any event shall be managed jointly by a commission of representatives from the municipalities as they shall respectively appoint.]

SEC. 3. <u>Submission of Question to the Voters</u>. An amendment to repeal Section 11-2 of the Home Rule Charter of the City and Borough of Wrangell, Alaska, shall be submitted to the voters of the City and Borough of Wrangell at the next regular borough election. The Borough Clerk shall prepare the proposition and perform all necessary steps in accordance with law to submit this proposition to the qualified voters of the Borough for approval or rejection at the next regular borough election, to be held October 6, 2015.

SEC. 4. <u>Proposition</u>. The proposition shall read substantially as follows:

PROPOSITION 1

CHARTER AMENDMENT

Shall the Home Rule Charter of the City and Borough of Wrangell be amended to repeal Section 11-2, Thomas Bay Power Authority, as set forth in Ordinance No. <u>900</u>.

SEC. 5. <u>Effective Date</u>. (a) The Charter amendment proposed in Section 2 of this ordinance shall become effective on the day following the date the election results are certified for the regular municipal election held on October 6, 2015, if approved by a majority of the qualified voters voting on the proposition set forth in Section 4.

(b) Sections 3 and 4 of this ordinance authorizing the submission of the proposition to

the qualified voters of the City and Borough shall become effective upon adoption.

BACKGROUND:

The deadline for filing Senior Property Tax Exemption Forms is March 1st of each year. The assessment notices go out on March 20th. The assessment notice shows the assessed value of property and also shows the amount of the exemption for Senior Exemptions. The assembly adopted an ordinance that provided for a grace period for seniors to file by April 15th. The ordinance is under WMC 5.04.040 B (2). The reason is that if they had not filed by March 1st, they could receive their assessment notice and that could be used as a reminder to them that it was not filed.

Although we advertise the senior exemption requirements in the paper, we generally have a handful of seniors that do not get their filings in on time. Some of the reasons often are because of medical and then there are others reasons such as some did not remember that you had to do this each year. Each year we try and make an effort to help those that qualify for the exemption as paperwork is difficult for people generally and can be more challenging as we get older

We have reviewed the exemption and letter that you have before you, and it qualifies for the exemption.

Request to Vacate Silvernail Work Road through the Marine Service Yard adjacent to Lot 4BB-1, W.S.I SUBD II Subdivision, from the fenced entrance behind City Market to Front Street, zoned Waterfront Development, requested by the Port Commission.

Background:

Several meetings and public hearings have been held before the Planning and Zoning Commission to discuss this request and another request involving vacating a portion of Silvernail Work Road submitted by the Bay Company.

In a separate action, the Bay Company requested vacation of an alley from Front Street to Silvernail Work road adjacent to Lots A and C, Bay Company Replat and was approved by the Assembly earlier this year.

The Wrangell Port Commission and the Planning and Zoning Commission met on-site in November to look at property lines, utility needs and access for both requests.

Findings:

Issues related to the Vacation included:

- Request to vacate and purchase a portion of Silvernail Work Road behind Lot C owned by the Bay Company. At this last meeting, David Powell indicated it was no longer relevant as long as access had to be provided to Lot C and withdrew the request.
- If vacated, two back lots (Lot C Bay Company and Lot 2 CBW) would no longer have road frontage and need access per WMC 19.28.050(B): The proposed easement to replace the ROW would extend to provide access to Lot C. Lot 2 could be combined with Lot 1 having Front Street road frontage or with the larger Marine Service Center lot.
- 3. *Dead End Road requirements:* If Silvernail Work Road were vacated from the end of pavement with no easement carrying through to Front Street, then a cul-de-sac with a 100 foot turning diameter would need to be recorded per WMC 19.24.080 at the terminus of the road behind the Museum.
- 4. Process depending on how the land was obtained by the City determines what State Regulations are applicable to the vacation process: The Borough Attorney verified that because the City purchased the land from APC in the 1990's and created the ROW, each half of the ROW does not have to go to adjacent landowners as often typical in ROW vacations.

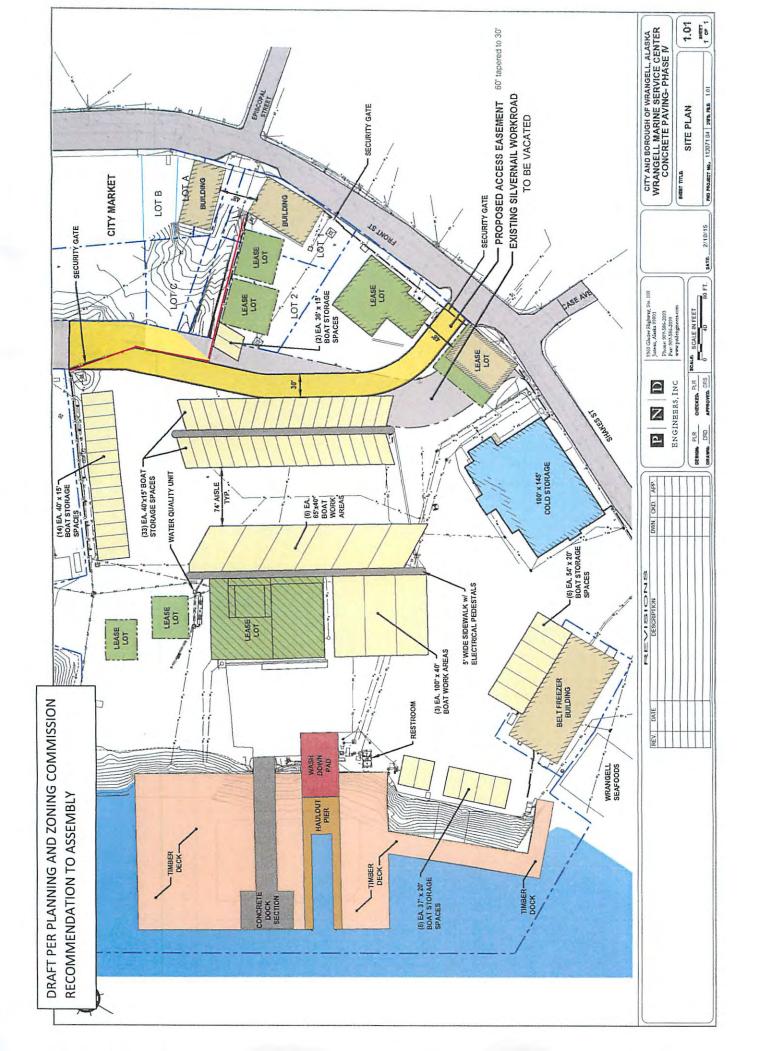
Recommendations:

The Planning and Zoning Commission at their April 9, 2015 meeting recommended to the Borough Assembly to vacate Silvernail Work Road from the end of the pavement behind the Museum to Front Street, and in place of the vacated ROW create a 60'wide access easement from the end of pavement to Lot C, Bay Company Replat to provide access to that lot, then taper the access easement to 30 foot wide, with the easement to be located within the driving lane to the current gated access on Front Street. In addition, City Lots 1 and Lot 2, Block B, Sortyard Subdivision shall be combined into one single Lot since Lot 2 loses access.

The Port Commission reviewed the request in November and moved to vacate Silvernail Work Road.

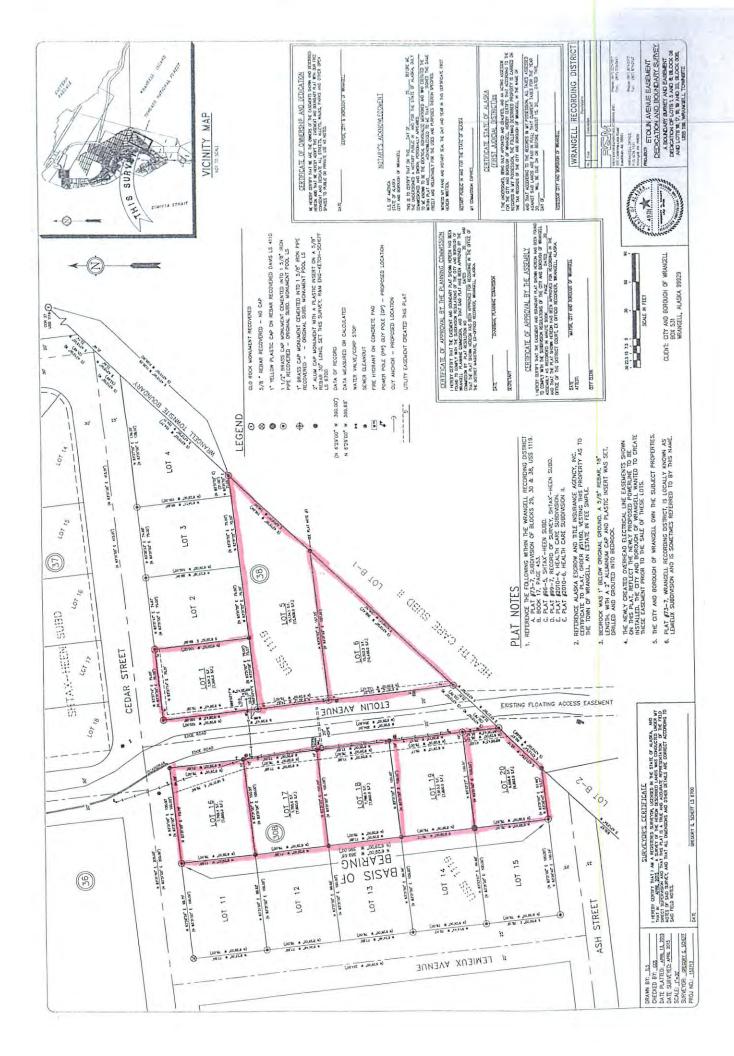

SUBJECT: Request from Mike Allen to purchase timber from the institute property along the existing road that was used by Mental Health

DATE: April 22, 2015

Basic Discussion about Timber Disposal by the city:

First off, I am the first to admit I know very little about the timber industry, determining values of trees and how to put out timber sales. Also, if the city is going to be doing some of this long term we will need to develop a process to make this work efficiently. Part of this may be to hire the services of the Forest Service, State Forestry Personnel or a private expert to assist us in this process. The request from Mike is explained below and will keep him operating for the rest of the year and the value seems at least in the ballpark according to the sources we have talked to although a complete analysis has not been done. This would be done without public bidding although the \$25,000 is the threshold for sealed bids. Then if it was bid, doing the bid document would be tricky because if the city was looking strictly at the value of the trees someone from out of town could get the bid. The value here also comes from having a local business stay in business. The point is that if we go through a long drawn out plan development with this current request, Mike is not going to have timber for months and months and then maybe be out bid from someone out of town. I am inclined to move forward with Mike's current request and then enter into an agreement with some expert in the field that could help us with developing our timber knowledge and assist in sales in the future.

Information:

Mike Allen has requested to purchase from the City approximately 250,000 board feet of Spruce Timber on the southern portion of the former Institute Property zoned holding. The Planning and Zoning Commission at their Special Meeting of April 16th, 2015 unanimously approved the Temporary Use requested. The memo from Planning and Zoning is attached which includes the conditions of the permit.

Mike in the attached letter has offered to purchase approximately 100 Spruce Trees which would contain about 250,000 board feet of timber for the amount of \$25,000. We confirmed with someone at the forest service that went up to the site with Mike and calculated the average board feet of 4 of the trees which appeared to be about the average and they ranged from 2300 to 2800 board feet per tree. The current going stumpage rate for Spruce from the forest service is about \$97 per 1000 board feet. Their formula is much more complicated and has a lot of variable elements. Mike's offer of \$100 per 1000 board feet appears to be a fair offer.

To complicate this just a little, Randy Oliver has requested of the City to allow him to cut a few trees down at no cost to him for the 4th of July logging show. We have talked to Mike to work with Randy to do this in the same area if the assembly approves the plan. Mike did not have a problem with that and would work with Randy. We will require both to provide proof of insurance prior to starting.

We feel this will keep Mike's mill operational for the rest of the year, the wood will be cut in Wrangell and it will provide some revenue to the city.

If approved, staff will draw up a contact with Mike which will include P&Z's conditions, insurance requirements and other language about the trees being processed in Wrangell.

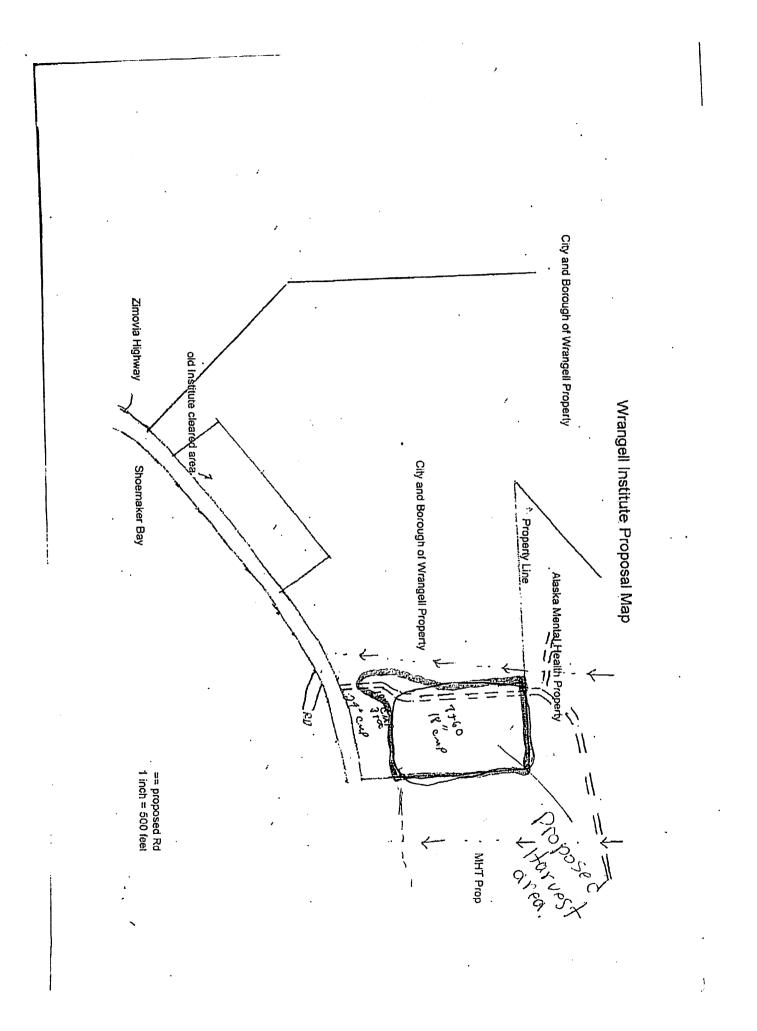

Findings:

The applicant is seeking to harvest approximately 10 acres from the Institute property. More specifically, he is requesting to harvest approximately 100 spruce trees estimated to be about 250,000 board feet of timber from the southeastern corner of the Institute Property off of the existing road constructed by Alcan Timber.

Mr. Allen estimates that the harvesting would be completed within a few months. All harvesting would be done from the existing road or from the road on Mental Health property.

The Planning and Zoning Commission will be making a recommendation to the Assembly. Typically on Temporary Use permits, the Commission is the final decision, but because the request is for use of public lands, the Commission will be making a recommendation to the Assembly regarding the proposed use and any conditions of approval. The Assembly would approve or disapprove of the request and establish the necessary fee structure.

Information:

Request from Wrangell Cooperative:

Bill Willard of Wrangell Cooperative Association contacted me some time ago about buying land from the City to develop as the office and yard location for the construction work that WCA has done around town. WCA has done multiple projects for the city such as the paving of Pine and Etolin, and Weber and paving with other projects we have worked on together. I have attached the letter from WCA requesting the 3 lots in the Industrial Park they would like to purchase at the appraised value. This would be a government to government sale.

Brett Woodbury, a contractor in town, would also like to have one of the three lots requested by WCA as it is adjacent to his existing two lots in the industrial area. He has offered to exchange an existing residential lot he has or to purchase the lot like WCA is requesting to do.

To try and resolve both requests, we had a meeting with all of the parties and asked them to consider options that might work for both of them. After some thought, WCA determined that they needed the 3 lots requested because they are the best for construction and for their needs and wanted to move forward with their request.

Deciding whether to bid the lots or sell directly to WCA is not a clear cut easy decision for the city for a variety of reasons. Here are some of the things staff thought about in looking at what would be in the best interest of the city:

- First, the sale to either would not require us to put in a street, whereas if these were put out to bid we may need to construct street access if someone else got a couple of the lots.
- If the land was sold to WCA, the city would need to provide utilities to the lots at a cost as much or more than the land would sell for depending on how many of their lots needed water and sewer. The three lots together would sell for about \$87,000 and the cost to put in water and sewer would be between \$66,000 and \$118,000.
- We get into the debate that government is getting something (outside of a bid process even though they are proposing to pay appraised value) when private business is willing to buy it.
- The land in private hands pays taxes on the land and WCA would not. The question of should government compete with private enterprise is always a topic of debate and although this is not exactly competing it is part of the discussion.
- WCA has done more than \$2.5 million in paving for the city and is in a position in the future to continue to help with road paving. With state funds drying up, it will be harder and harder to get grant money to pave streets. WCA has access to monies the city doesn't through their various programs and if this would help that process it would be a positive thing for the

community. With this land they would like to develop a base to operate from which would allow them the ability to do more things.

- The question came up that if WCA could not sustain the current program into the future because of personnel changes or changes in federal funding, would this then be a good investment for the city.
- Other businesses and individuals have expressed an interest in industrial lots as well and would be happy to bid on these same lots. The City has considered bidding the lots without any utilities... such that they could be used for storage only.
- Arrowhead has expressed an interest in one of the lots in this area, although not involved in the lots being discussed. They want to move their propane tank to allow more room in their yard as they construct warehousing improvements.
- Brett's argument is that he needs the land to further develop his business that will help to employ Wrangell residents.
- Also, there currently are no other city industrial lots for sale and there is still a demand for them. We are trying to figure out a way to put more lots out, but at the current site we are pinned in because of lots that were set aside because of wetlands mitigation or because of lack of access, and poor land for development (wet).

As discussed by staff we have 3 options and all have their good points and bad because of the above discussion:

- 1. Option #1: Sell the land to WCA at the appraised value and install utilities to the lots. The three lots requested would appraise at approximately \$87,000. Carl Johnson had estimated utilities to the first lot would be about \$65,400. Costs to provide water and sewer to all three lots would be about \$117,300. It is possible that WCA would build on the two lots together and not need utilities on the third lot. This would be a government to government transaction and we believe we could do this without public bidding.
- 2. Option #2: Do a land exchange for one of the lots to Brett Woodbury where the city would get the residential lot Brett has and the city would give Brett the industrial lot, based on appraised values of each lot. Although we did this with Brett in an exchange for another industrial lot, it was industrial to industrial. This is residential to industrial so uses are different even though values may be similar, We don't believe it is the best interest of the City to have others offer a similar exchange and have to deal with everyone wanting to trade land.
- 3. Option #3: The city puts in the road and then we could put up 5 lots for bid and anyone could bid on them.

We feel this is a policy call on the assembly as there are good reasons to accept options 1 or 3.

The purpose of this letter is to provide you with the information requested in Mr. Jabusch's October 21, 2014 email. We would like to address:

- 1. Our need for land
- 2. Details of our plans for the proposed lots
- 3. Community benefit
- 4. Why the proposed lots should not be put out to bid

As an introduction, the Wrangell Cooperative Association (WCA) is a federally recognized Tribe incorporated April 30, 1942 under Section 16 of the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934, as amended for Alaska in 1936. WCA serves a membership of 400 Alaska Native and American Indians. An eight-member Tribal Council, elected by the WCA membership, serves as the governing body and sets policy for programs and administration. WCA is a non-profit entity.

WCA has a government-to-government relationship with the Federal Highways Administration (FHWA) for the Tribal Transportation Program. WCA receives funding from the FHWA to plan, design, manage, rehabilitate and maintain roads, paths, trails and bridges that are included in WCA's Tribal Transportation Inventory.

WCA has made it a priority to complete projects which provide economic development and community benefit to the citizens of Wrangell. The foundation of the Transportation Program is based on collaboration between local, state and federal entities to provide safe and reliable access to healthcare, education, recreation and economic opportunities.

One such example is the Shtax-Heen Roadway Project. WCA, in partnership with the City and Borough of Wrangell, collaborated to provide improved access along this roadway for drivers and pedestrians. WCA funded the \$2 million project, which involved paving the roadway and installing pedestrian walkways. Prior to construction, only 400 of the 2,700 feet of roadway were paved. The Shtax-Heen Roadway project was a high-priority improvement, as many residents live along the corridor and benefitted from improved access and safety.

The Weber Street Reconstruction Project is another success in collaboration between WCA and the City and Borough of Wrangell, which provided significant benefits to community residents. Although the project was shorter than the Shtax-Heen Roadway Project, the improvements were more extensive. The \$750,000 project included installing storm drain systems, curb and gutter, sidewalk, and concrete paving along 500 feet of Weber Street. The project successfully provided safe vehicular and pedestrian access, minimized hazards and dust and addressed drainage issues.

Under the model of collaboration, WCA also has the goal of economic development through job creation and job training. In 2013, WCA performed routine maintenance on U.S. Forest Service trails. The trail work expanded into roads maintenance, and in 2014, WCA replaced 25-year-old culverts on Nemo Loop Road and Pat's Lake Road which were critical to the lifespan of these transportation systems. The roads maintenance project continued the trails goal of tangibly building capacity through workforce development. WCA hired and trained individuals in trail work and construction operations with the goal of assisting community members in finding and building meaningful careers. Both the trail work and the roads work provided jobs to Wrangell residents and completed projects which otherwise would not have been possible given budgetary constraints of the U.S. Forest Service.

WCA is appreciative of the relationships built and fostered over the years, working together with the City and Borough of Wrangell, and other entities, to improve transportation and provide economic development opportunities for the residents of our community. The government-to-government relationship between WCA and the City and Borough of Wrangell is a model of successful collaboration, which we anticipate continuing into the future.

1. Our need for land:

The next step in the development of the Tribal Transportation Program is to secure facilities to enable WCA to continue to provide economic development and community benefit. Currently, WCA is renting office space on Lynch Street and storing equipment for transportation projects at the U.S. Forest Service. We would like to build a WCA Department of Transportation, which would involve purchasing property to build an office and provide areas to store and maintain heavy equipment and other supplies used on transportation projects.

2. Details of our plans for the proposed lots:

As we come closer to a resolution on the purchase of property, WCA will hire the appropriate professionals to design buildings and landscape architecture. Our vision for the property is to house a WCA Department of Transportation, which would include offices, a conference room and storage space. It would also include storage and maintenance areas for heavy equipment used on various transportation projects. We envision the facility supplying the needs of WCA now, and in the future, as the Transportation Program continues to grow and develop. We are initially interested in Lot 5A, Block 61; Lot 6A, Block 61; and Lot 8, Block 66. We are aware the City and Borough of Wrangell has two parties interested in the five lots available for purchase. We would like to work together with the City and Borough of Wrangell and be informed of the process involved in the selection of which lots will be most suitable for AML and WCA.

3. Community benefit:

WCA's transportation projects have provided significant economic development and community benefit to the citizens of Wrangell. WCA, through partnership with the City and Borough of Wrangell, has expended over two million dollars on priority transportation projects to improve access and safety of transportation corridors in the City and Borough of Wrangell. Residents enjoy paved roadways with improved conditions on Pine Street, Etolin Avenue, Cedar Street, Shtax-Heen Circle and Weber Street. Residents of Wrangell also benefit from secured access to subsistence, recreation and culturally-significant areas on U.S. Forest Service Roads through the trails and roads maintenance projects. Lastly, residents of Wrangell benefit from economic opportunities through job creation and the capacity-building workforce development goals that are the foundation of the projects WCA undertakes to serve the community of Wrangell. WCA continues future transportation projects with the objective of providing employment opportunities and assisting community members in finding and building meaningful careers.

4. Why the proposed lots should not be put out to bid:

Chapter 16.12 of the City and Borough of Wrangell Municipal Code lays out guidelines under which the proposed lots should not be put out to bid:

A. In the exercise of the borough's economic development powers, the assembly may determine, in its sole discretion, that it is in the best interest of the borough to dispose of borough-owned real property, including tidelands, or any interest therein, which interest has a value of \$1,000,000 or less (as determined by the borough assessor or a qualified appraiser), without requests for proposals or sealed bid procedures and at less than fair market value.

B. In determining the best interests of the borough under this section, the assembly may consider any relevant factors, which may include:

1. The desirability of the economic development project;

2. The actual or potential economic benefits to the borough, its economy and other businesses in the borough;

3. The contribution of the proponent to the economic development project in terms of money, labor, innovation, expertise, experience and otherwise . . .

[Wrangell Municipal Code, Chapter 16.12.012]

Given the economic benefit tangibly received by the City and Borough of Wrangell through collaboration with WCA, Wrangell Municipal Code 16.12 applies to the sale of property to WCA to enable the continuation of transportation projects which benefit the entire community of Wrangell. To date, the City and Borough of Wrangell gained newly-constructed transportation corridors without incurring significant capital costs. Citizens in Wrangell benefitted from job creation and job training. Access to cultural and recreation areas was secured on U.S. Forest Service lands, enjoyed by all community members.

The mutual benefits gained by both governments, WCA and the City and Borough of Wrangell, demonstrate an effective model of collaboration and cooperation which provide a model for other Tribes and governmental institutions throughout Alaska. This multi-faceted collaborative approach is ideal in a financial environment of dwindling dollars, under which all entities pool resources for the mutual benefit of many stakeholders. Given the success already realized under this model of collaboration, WCA respectfully requests the City and Borough of Wrangell apply Wrangell Municipal Code 16.12 and offer property to WCA without sealed bid procedures to enable WCA to more effectively continue to provide significant economic development and community benefit to the City and Borough of Wrangell and the citizens it serves.

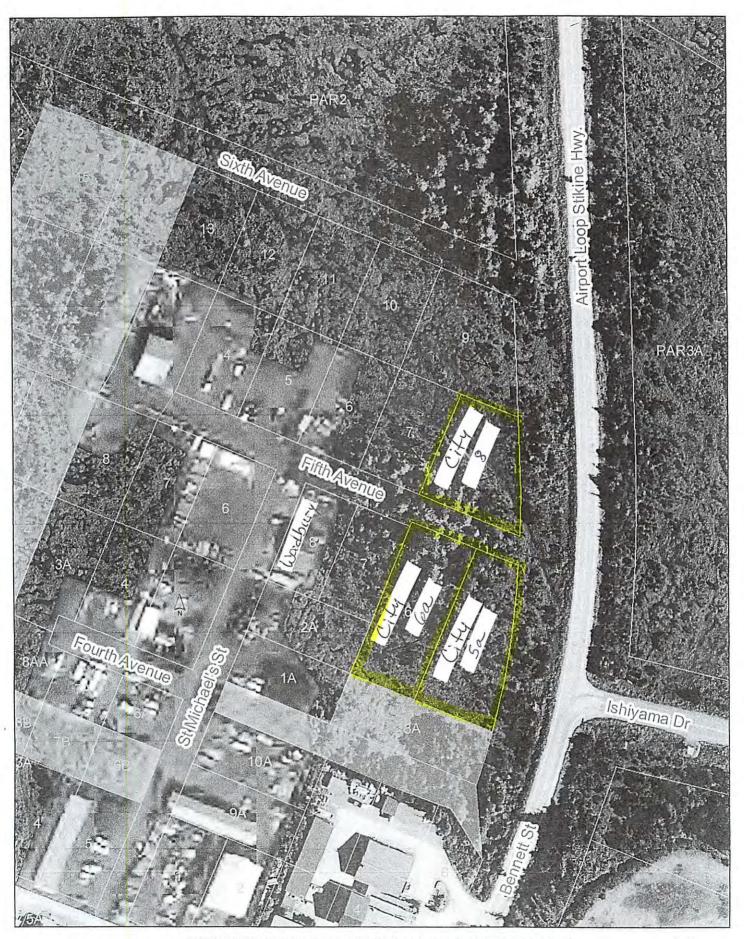

BACKGROUND:

During 2013, the City and Borough of Wrangell entered into a grant agreement with the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for the Sewer Pumps Replacement project, accepting funds in the amount of \$470,884.00, or 75% of the initial total project cost, which was then estimated at \$627,845.00.

Through the engineering design process, we determined that significant design parameters would need to be modified in order to accommodate the drastic variations in flow due to rainwater infiltration in the collection system. This, coupled with the underestimation of the electrical service and controls, resulted in a project funding shortfall of approximately \$343,000.00, to fully rehabilitate both pump stations.

Staff requested additional assistance from the CDBG in order to make up this funding shortfall. The CDBG recently approved the request by providing additional grant funds in the amount of \$257,250.00, with the understanding that the City & Borough of Wrangell will provide the additional matching funds of \$85,750.00. An Amendment #01 to the subject Grant Agreement has been issued by the DCCED/CDBG for execution by the CBW. By signing the Amendment, the CBW commits to provide the additional matching funds.

The required 25% matching funds for the initial \$470,884.00 grant were approved through Borough Assembly Resolution 12-12-1262, accepting an ADEC loan in the amount of \$196,928.00. The additional matching funds of \$85,750.00 are currently being sought through a CBW grant application to the Rural Development, Water and Waste Disposal Loan and Grant Program. Further, we are including the initial \$196,928.00 match under this Rural Development grant application as well, in an attempt to eliminate or minimize use of the loan funds. If unsuccessful in securing the Rural Development grant, the additional \$85,750.00 matching funds will be committed from the Sewer Department's user fee reserves, which at the date of this writing has a projected FY15 ending balance of approximately \$354,000.00.

RECOMMENDATION:

Move to accept the \$257,250.00 additional grant funds from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), authorize the Borough Manager to execute Amendment #01 for the Sewer Pumps Replacement project and approve the matching portion of this grant to come from either a potential and pending USDA grant or sewer reserves.

BACKGROUND

The City and Borough of Wrangell received a grant from the Department of Commerce, Community and Economic Development (DCCED) and Division of Community and Regional Affairs Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for the design of the Sewer Pumps Replacement Project.

DOWL of Juneau is the engineer of record on this project. Due to the integral role that DOWL has played in this project to date, along with their in-depth knowledge of the existing conditions and the design, it was the desire of the City and Borough of Wrangell to negotiate with DOWL Engineers for the contract administration and the construction inspection services for the improvements to the sewer facilities.

DOWL engineers provided the City and Borough of Wrangell with a cost estimate for this project's CA services, in the amount of \$21,176.00.

Dear Mrs. McMurren:

Thank you for the opportunity to provide design services for rehabilitation of the lift stations at node 4 and node 6. With the 95% drawings complete, the scope of remaining work is now clearly defined. DOWL requests an amendment to our base contract for additional design and construction period services.

Additional Design Services

At the onset of design work, one of the fundamental assumptions was that the existing 2-pump systems would be replaced with newer, more efficient 2-pump systems. Preliminary design investigations revealed that flow rates during heavy rain events can be as much as four times the average flow rates. In order to more efficiently handle the wide range of flows, DOWL recommended a switch to a 3-pump system. While this change will ultimately result in reduced operating costs, it did require the following additional design work:

- Selection of smaller pumps (after selecting larger pumps for a 2-pump system)
- Creation of 3-D models to ensure the 3-pump system would fit within the existing stations
- · Structural design to replace concrete vault lids to accommodate new hatches
- Revisions to the design memo, plan sheets, and cost estimates

Another design assumption was that the PLC and SCADA panels would be replaced with new. After deciding to specify a new user-friendly Flygt multi-smart control panel, some electrical re-design was required:

- Removal of the new PLC panels from design documents
- Incorporation of the existing SCADA panels to maintain communication
- · Revisions to the design memo, cost estimates, and specifications

Lastly, providing assistance with division 0 of the specifications (general conditions, bonding, insurance, and other information pertaining to bidding) has required additional time.

Construction Period Services

DOWL also appreciates the opportunity to provide our services during the bid period, construction, and project closeout. We have made the following assumptions for this phase:

- Site visits will be limited to one trip by Carson Dorn for the startup of each lift station (total of two trips), and one trip by EPS after the completion of both lift stations to perform a final inspection.
- The design team will perform the following tasks remotely:
 - o Assistance during the bid period
 - Submittal Reviews
 - o Design Clarifications
 - o Participate in progress meetings as requested
 - o Record Drawings from contractor provided markups
 - o Assistance with DEC approval to operate
- It is assumed that day to day inspection and administration of the contract (pay estimates, change orders, field orders, etc.) will be performed by CBW public works staff with assistance from the design team.
