Mayor Jack requested clarification on section 15.18.052; questioned if someone burning trash in a burn barrel would be in violation of this new section.

Bruce Smith, Wrangell Police Sergeant, stated that this new section was previously in section 15.18.050 and had been removed because it did not fit into that section.

Jack stated that he couldn't see having people call the fire hall to get a permit every time they wanted to burn some boxes.

Assembly Member Prysunka stated that it was not a bad idea to call and at least notify the fire department when you are going to be burning; that way people will not assume that there is an uncontrolled fire and call for the fire department to respond; a phone call to the fire department just to let them know is typically all that has been done. Prysunka also stated that alerting the Fire Department when you are going to be burning would eliminate people burning when there is a fire ban in effect.

Assembly Member Mitchell said that there probably needs to be more work on this ordinance.

Manager Jabusch stated that at the city dump, they are allowed to burn only certain materials.

Kent Miller-Manager of Northend Ferry Authority PO Box 10871, Coffman Cove 99918. The Rainforest Island Ferry is intended to operate year around service, 4 days a week-Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday between Coffman Cove, Wrangell and Banana Point on South Mitkof. It is also planned for less frequent service to Roosevelt harbor on Zarembo Island and possible extensions of service to ST John's harbor and other locations in the vicinity. The intent is to have two stops and two trips a day. This is to provide services for medical, dental and shopping.

It is a core feature of the service plan for the Rainforest Island Ferry. It can only be accomplished only by good access to a terminal, a launch ramp in this case that works both north bound and south bound. We did negotiate an agreement with Shoe Maker Bay. The approach for the SMB wasn't feasible. We reverted to the old city launch ramp. With the schedule that gets into Wrangell, twice a day with a four hour interval, basically we could only catch either the northbound arrival or the southbound arrival and departure at Wrangell. It stands to reason that if you need half tide to get in, the order of eight feet of water it's not going to happen twice with a four hour interval. General speaking, we miss that potentially second trip. The reason it is important, people can come to Wrangell as walk on

passengers, we can't develop the ability to move those people and their vehicles with the load that we expect them to want to buy in Wrangell.

He understands the funding for Heritage Harbor launch ramp is a potentially ideal place for the Ferry to call twice a day with good access. He also understands that the funding is intended for recreational use, but apart from other features it is an excellent opportunity to expand. He is focusing on Heritage due to their competing uses and the location. Northend Ferry Authority is willing to make every effort to find a terminal that's not similarly competitive. Clay and Greg have introduced us to the seaplane haul out ramp at the airport. They have applied to the State to use it as a terminal. We know that the DOT and other interested parties are going to take time, a minimal amount of time a month or two. It is a huge disadvantage.

After much discussion the Port Commissioners decided, based on the
correspondence, they are not able to grant approval. Per agreement with the State,
we would be in breach of the contract. It is there hope that they can find another
alternative to work for the Rainforest Island Ferry.

Don Sorric-Superior Marine Service Center, MSC-Lots 1&2 Wrangell, AK.

The last meeting he had discussed the fire that they had before everyone left for the summer. There was some confusion on where the fire extinguisher were. They think it ought to be labeled.

They haven't got there water yet and they were written up by OSHA for no water. He has talked to Amber about the water and she says it's close. He has bought another extinguisher to appease OSHA.

On the new building he is not sure how he is supposed to submit it for approval. He submitted it as a metal fab shop. He put a 12x12 office and 12x12 meeting room in there. He also has built 12x16 bunk upstairs. He says that he has spent the night down there. The reason is there are things that can't be left alone. He states that it also falls into unattended purposes for the lease. He was told to come and let the commissioners know what he is doing.

 After much discussion the Commissioners decided Sorric needs to draft up a short letter stating what it is and what the intended purposes are for the metal fabrication shop. The Port will go through the steps of getting it approved or not.

7. REPORTS

a. Harbormaster

Meissner

- **SMB Float project**-The AK Harbormaster's conference is Oct. 14th in Anchorage. If we rank high we would receive funding in July 2016. The city has to sell revenue bonds to help cover our share of the project so there are still lots to do prior to the project.
- **City Dock**-we have 450,000.00 left in that grant. The first project will be to replace the electrical system. Conduit and feeders to the dock, street lights, and turning dolphin summer float and gangway on the sought side of the approach. This would be followed with hand rails like the north side of the approach.
- Meyer's Chuck-Harbor staff built and installed a kiosk on the float. We included all of the necessary forms and instruction for filling out the forms. He walked Kasey thru it. They installed reserved signs for the individuals who took permanent moorage.
- Marine Service Center-Someone stole the compressed air foam firefighting
 equipment from the boat yard. They have reported it to the police and have emailed
 other harbor departments around Southeast. They are going to get more 10 to 20lb
 ones to put out in the yard.

b. Commissioners

Hammer-Assembly asked the Port to look into the Rainforest Island Ferry. He wants to kick this thing around with the Greg and talk to the State to see if there is a short term possibly to use Heritage.

Yeager-Mr. Miller do you feel like the sea plane ramp is sufficient for landing and for walk-on's?

Miller-These are questions that have to come up in the application and permitting process. If the State is willing to work on it with them, it has a lot of potential.

Hammer-Camera's in the work area it seems to be coming up a lot. He would like to revisit it to get some funding for the cameras.

c. Port and harbor safety concerns

Hammer-He wants to work with High School Shop building larger life jacket coat racks.

Meissner-He is working on it.

Martin-Make sure we have an updated list of pricing and make sure we have the funding for the future.

Meissner-He will start collecting the data.

Presentation on the State's Sustainable Future

This was an eye opener for everyone in attendance. To give you some idea of the magnitude, you could lay off all state employees, including the University of Alaska and that would only make a dent in the deficit. The simple financial model that was development and was used at the presentation allows people to play with options to both increase revenues and reduce expenses. It appeared that the only item that was big enough to make any difference was to use a portion of the dividend. Even options to have a state income tax or sales tax did not get us to a balanced budget.

We will all feel the pain before it is over; either through reduced services, income tax or less money from the state to the borough. We already know that we are going to be challenged by these reductions. If anyone has the opportunity to get on the state's home page and then click on the button that says **Building a Sustainable Future- Join the Conversation**. Once you are in there you can read the instructions and select the level of the financial model. I would select the simple version initially because that will give you the general picture and how it works and how much change is going to be necessary to balance the budget. If you have questions, Carol Rushmore or I can help.

Projects being worked on:

• Cassiar Street Improvements-

Cassiar Street Phase II is complete. We will do a final walk through to be sure everything is complete and then the overall project is complete. I think this project was a long time coming and I believe the citizens that waited for years now have a paved road. Also, being able to have paved with concrete vs. asphalt will last years longer and it is a road that should not need any work done to it for the next 30 years or more.

• Evergreen Road Improvements

DOT/PF is scheduling a meeting for the public to see the current plans in November. We have provided the names to DOT/PF of everyone that lives along that road so they can be sent notification of the meeting.

 Sewer Pump Station- We're out to bid on this project with bids to be opened in early November. We are still working with USDA on the mounds of paperwork they require. They have told us that we are not allowed to award the bid until all of their requirements are met. We are going to do everything we can to accomplish this. The last item is that we need to show clear title to the land that we are going have the project on. We are working with the attorney and the title company, but it is an area that there are title issues with the surrounding parcels that may end up affecting us as well. If we can't satisfy them, we will move forward without their assistance. We would give up a \$68,000 grant and a \$91,000 loan at 2.875% and replace the funding with a DEC loan for \$190,000 at 1.5% interest. We just don't want to delay and lose the \$728,000 grant with the state for not finishing the project by next June 30th.

- <u>Court Room Remodel</u>- The bids are out on the court room remodel. This should be a good winter project for a contractor. We will work with the court on scheduling which may include temporarily relocating to other space in the court building.
- **RFP for Mill** This RFP went out last week and opened on October 28th, 2015. Once we get the list of those that submit an RFP, a selection committee will grade each application and then bring the preferred firm to the assembly for approval on November 10th. During this process, we will keep in touch with Mr. Buhler so that he knows our process is on track.
- **RFP for Institute Property** the RFP for the Institute Property (roughly 5 mile Zimovia) also went out last week and will be opened on October 28, 2015. We will go through the same process as the Mill RFP. The committee's recommendation will be brought to the assembly for approval on November 10th.

Finance Department:

Lee Burgess and I plan to make a trip to Craig so that we can set down and thoroughly go through the accounting software that they use. We need to replace our 20 year old software because they will no longer support it in the next couple of years. The urgency is that is takes about 9 months to a year to get scheduled for the changeover and then a couple of months to run parallel to be sure the new system is getting the same answers as the old one. This is a little bit of an urgent item because of the moved up timeline with the existing software.

The new part time position of collection clerk has been paying off. We have collected about \$30,000 of previously uncollected funds owed to the city. We are going to expand some of the areas she has been working on and hopefully that will pay off as well.

Light Department:

The light department will be hiring 3 or 4 temporary employees to work on the annual brush clearing addressing overgrowth that affects our power right of way and service drops. Although homeowners are responsible for keeping their own service drops clear, the line department will assist them if it cannot be done safely by the owner.

The department has worked with the forest service to get a tree for Christmas and the holidays. I have been told that we have the bragging rights of having the tallest Christmas tree in Southeast Alaska and we don't plan on that changing this year as well.

Recently, we loaned our large bucket truck to Petersburg for some work they needed to do that they could not do with their existing equipment. We have a good working relationship with all their departments and have exchange information, equipment and other things in the spirit of cooperation. This has gone both ways over the years and is a good relationship to have. It has allowed both of us in some cases not to have to buy the same piece of equipment.

It is anticipated that staff will bring to the assembly a request to have an electric rate study done on the November 10th meeting. This is being prompted from the system study that was finished recently. The system study identified some major concerns and currently there are not enough reserves to resolve them over a long period of time. We are hoping that the rate study will provide a look at ways to increase the funding to do these improvements.

Library Department:

The library held an Elder Law Clinic that was made available through the OWL (On Line with Libraries) program funded by the state. It was very well received. We had more attendees than we could accommodate.

We have begun our Fall Storytime. It began on October 1 and will continue through December 17th. It is every Thursday morning from 10-11 am. It includes stories, snack and a craft. We have had a great turnout so far.

The Friends of the Library brought a genealogist to town to do a workshop on beginning genealogy and a more advanced workshop for those who are already familiar with the resources. It was a huge success with patrons asking if we could bring her back again to do another one.

The Friends of the Library have also just recently subscribed to Lynda.com. It is an online education company offering thousands of video courses in software, creative, and business skills. Patrons will be able to access tutorials from their own homes using their library cards. We are getting prepared to do a launch to introduce this to the community.

We also hosted a videoconference called Game On. Learn to design your own video game; taught by Josh Hughes from an entertainment company in Montana. It is aimed at pre-teens, teens and young adults. We had a good turnout, but there was a misunderstanding on the time difference in Alaska and it has been rescheduled for this weekend.

Theater Department:

On December 16th of this year, the theater will have been in operation for 10 years. The staff plans to have a special 10-year anniversary celebration.

The Nolan Center Theater/Castle Mt. Entertainment is happy to welcome Greg Acuna as the new assistant manager. Greg began training the week of October 12th and has already proven to be a willing and enthusiastic addition to the team.

- SEC. 1. <u>Action</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend Title 9, Health and Safety, of the Wrangell Municipal Code, specifically certain sections in Chapter 9.08, Nuisances, and Chapter 9.16, Littering.
- SEC. 2. Amendment. Section 9.08.120 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

9.08.120 Penalty for violation.

In addition to the remedies provided by this chapter against any such building or other structure, any person, firm, association or corporation who willfully violates any provision of this chapter, or who willfully fails or refuses to comply with final order, determination, decision or judgment of the board of adjustment made in accordance with the provisions of this chapter, or any final intermediate order made in accordance with the provisions of this chapter by the borough manager, fire chief, chief of police, building inspector, or health officer, or other authorized officer or employee of the borough shall be punishable as provided for in WMC 1.20.010. Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by a fine of up to \$500.00 if the offense is not listed in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule.

Background

The proposed Ordinance is being brought forward in order to address the violations in Chapter 11 by placing them in the minor offence fine schedule in title 1. This is a requirement of the State of Alaska's Court System. Essentially, if we do not list the fines and/or penalties in the fine schedule in Title 1, the violation is a mandatory court appearance.

Having the fines and/or penalties listed out in Title 1 will help law enforcement and the residents of Wrangell to be clear on what the penalty/fee is for each violation.

Also as stated above, this is a **requirement** of the State of Alaska's Court System.

ORDINANCE NO. 910

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, AMENDING TITLE 11, VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC, OF THE WRANGELL MUNICIPAL CODE, SPECIFICALLY CERTAIN SECTIONS IN CHAPTERS 11.04, 11.08, 11.12, 11.30, 11.36, 11.64, 11.68 AND 11.76, TO ADD PROVISIONS ON PENALTY FOR VIOLATION, MAKE CORRECTIONS, AND REPEAL CERTAIN SECTIONS OF CHAPTER 11.28 AND CHAPTER 11.32 IN ITS ENTIRETY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA:

[The changes to the existing code are shown as follows: the words that are <u>underlined are</u> to be added and the words that are [bolded and in brackets are to be deleted].]

- SEC. 1. <u>Action</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend Title 11, Vehicles and Traffic, of the Wrangell Municipal Code, specifically certain sections in Chapters 11.04, 11.28, 11.30, 11.32, 11.36, 11.64, 11.68, and 11.76, and to repeal certain sections in Chapter 11.28 and Chapter 11.32 in its entirety. The section and chapter numbers of repealed sections and chapters are reserved for future use.
- SEC 2. <u>Amendment</u>. The list of sections in Chapter 11.04, General Provisions, of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

Chapter 11.04 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sections:

- 11.04.010 Adoption of State Uniform Traffic Laws by Reference.
- 11.04.020 [State surcharges] Traffic Fine Schedule Adoption of State Bail Forfeiture Schedules by Reference.
- 11.04.030 [Violation Penalty]Chief of Police Regulation Authority.
- SEC. 3. <u>Amendment</u>. Sections of 11.04.010, 11.04.020 and 11.04.030 of the Wrangell Municipal Code are amended to read:

11.04.010 Adoption of State Uniform Traffic Laws by Reference.

[There is hereby incorporated by reference into this code, except as otherwise provided by the Charter, Title 13 of the Administrative Code, and all noncriminal Title 28 Traffic Statutes, to the extent that such provisions are in effect on or following the date of the ordinance codified in this section.] In addition to the traffic ordinances of this Title 11, the borough adopts by reference all vehicle and traffic statutes and regulations of the State of Alaska, as they presently exist and as they may be revised in the future, as the traffic code for the borough, except for felonies and misdemeanors not listed on Alaska Supreme Court bail forfeiture schedules.

11.04.020 [State surcharges] <u>Traffic Fine Schedule – Adoption of State Bail</u> Forfeiture Schedules by Reference.

[The borough police may notify persons charged with motor vehicle violations that the state has imposed surcharges on traffic fines as stated in AS 12.55.039 and 28.05.151(c).]

The borough adopts as its traffic fine schedule the "Traffic Bail Forfeiture Schedule" and the "Oversize Vehicle Bail Forfeiture Schedule" in Administrative Rules 43.1 and 43.6 of the Alaska Rules of Court and any other bail forfeiture schedules relating to vehicles adopted by the Alaska Supreme Court. In addition, the borough adopts all amendments of those schedules that become effective after the effective date of this ordinance. Citations for offenses listed on these schedules may be disposed of as provided in AS 12.25.195 - .230, without a court appearance, upon payment of the amounts listed plus the state surcharge required by AS 12.55.039 and AS 29.25.074. Fines must be paid to the Police Department. If a traffic offense is not listed on this fine schedule or another fine schedule ordinance, the defendant must appear in court to answer to the charges. Citations charging these offenses must meet the requirements of Minor Offense Rule 3 of the Alaska Rules of Court. If a person charged with one of these offenses appears in court and is found guilty, the penalty imposed for the offense may not exceed the amount listed for that offense on the schedule. The fines established in these fine schedules may not be reduced.

11.04.030 [Violation – Penalty] Chief of police regulation authority.

[Penalties for violation of any provisions of this chapter shall be by a fine/penalty of not more than \$300.00. The imposition of demerit points, revocation or suspension of licenses or restrictions thereof, as may be imposed by the state pursuant to its rules, regulations and statutes, are independent of any penalty under this chapter.]

The chief of police is empowered to make regulations necessary to make effective the provisions of the traffic ordinances of the borough and to make and enforce temporary or experimental regulations to cover parking control or emergencies or special conditions. Except for parking regulations, no such temporary or experimental regulations shall remain in effect for more than 90 days. Every such temporary or experimental regulation shall be submitted to the borough assembly at the assembly's regular meeting prior to the enforcement of such regulation, and, in the event the assembly disapproves its enforcement, the police department shall not thereafter enforce such regulation.

SEC. 4. <u>Repeal.</u> Chapter 11.08, Definitions, of the Wrangell Municipal Code is repealed:

Chapter 11.08 [DEFINITIONS] Repealed

[Sections:

11.08.010 Chief of police regulation authority.]

[The chief of police is empowered to make regulations necessary to make effective the provisions of the traffic ordinances of the borough and to make and enforce temporary or experimental regulations to cover parking control or emergencies or special conditions. Except for parking regulations, no such temporary or experimental regulations shall remain in effect for more than 90 days. Every such temporary or experimental regulation shall be submitted to the borough assembly at the assembly's regular meeting prior to the enforcement of such regulation, and, in the event the assembly disapproves its enforcement, the police department shall not thereafter enforce such regulation.]

SEC. 5. <u>Repeal</u>. Chapter 11.12, Administration, of the Wrangell Municipal Code is repealed:

In any area, on any street, immediately fronting the curb, between fixed signs, or where the curb is marked with red paint and a sign is either erected along the curb or painted in red or white on the street fronting the curb, indicating the area between the fixed signs, or fronting the red curbline, to be a bus stop, loading zone, driveway, or licensed vehicle stand;
- B. Within any area entirely enclosed by red lines painted on the curb and street, or painted on the street, and designated by the words "no parking" painted within the enclosed area in red and white, or otherwise marked by an appropriate sign, or by a combination of placed and painted signs, indicating no parking permitted;
- C. Within any area where a parking meter is installed, excepting as provided by such parking meter and the traffic code of the borough.]
- SEC. 8. <u>Amendment</u>. Sections 11.28.020, 030, and 040 of the Wrangell Municipal Code are amended to read:

11.28.020 Prohibited parking places [generally].

It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any [motor or other] vehicle to stop, stand or park the same in any of the following places, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic, or in compliance with the directions of a police officer, or a traffic control sign or signal. No sign shall be required to designate this prohibition.

- A. Within an intersection;
- B. On a crosswalk;

[C. At a bus stop;]

[D]C. Within [15] 20 feet of the driveway entrance to any fire station or directly across the street from such entrance;

[E]D. On a sidewalk;

[F]E. Alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction when such stopping, standing or parking would impede or obstruct traffic.

11.28.030 Red-painted curbs and signs - No parking.

 \underline{A} . All curbing painted red shall mean no parking at any time. Other restrictions shall be shown by standard parking signs. No person shall park or stand a vehicle in violation of any parking sign or in violation of a parking prohibition indicated by curbing which is painted red.

B. No person shall park or stand a vehicle in any area entirely enclosed by red lines painted on the curb and street, or painted on the street, and designated by the words "no parking" painted within the enclosed area in red and/or white, or otherwise marked by an appropriate sign, or by a combination of placed and painted signs, indicating no parking permitted.

11.28.040 Time-limit parking <u>— Impounding.</u>

<u>A.</u> It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any [motor or other] vehicle to leave, place, stand, or park the same vehicle on any street, highway, alley, walk, or other public thoroughfare within the borough on or within any area and/or zone designated as a time-limit parking area and/or zone for a period of time greater than as specified by a posted appropriate sign. [Such vehicles found to be in violation are subject to impound at the owner or operator's expense.]

- B. In addition to the penalty provided for a violation of this title, any vehicle found parked as prohibited in this section may be removed and impounded by any police officer of the borough and the removal and impounding costs shall be charged against the offending vehicle and paid before release of such vehicle.
- SEC. 9. <u>Repeal</u>. Sections 11.28.050, 11.28.060, and 11.28.070 of the Wrangell Municipal Code are repealed:

11.28.050 [Prohibited 24-hour parking – Impounding] Repealed.

[A. It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any motor or other vehicle to leave, place or park the same for 24 hours continuously on any street, highway, alley, walk, or other public thoroughfare within the borough that is posted or otherwise marked by an appropriate sign, or by a combination of placed and painted signs, that indicate 24-hour parking is prohibited. Signs shall be required for enforcement of this section.

B. In addition to the penalty provided for violation of this title, any vehicle found parked for 24 hours continuously as prohibited in this section shall be removed and impounded by any police officer of the borough and the removal and impounding costs shall be charged against the offending vehicle and paid before release of such vehicle.]

11.28.060 [Prohibited parking on sidewalk] Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any motor or other vehicle at any time to leave, place or park the same on any sidewalk or part thereof. No sign shall be required to designate this prohibition.]

11.28.070 [Prohibited parking in licensed vehicle stand]Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any motor or other vehicle, other than the licensee or permittees of the licensee, at any time to leave, place or park the same within the boundary or area or any part thereof of any licensed taxi, bus or other licensed vehicle stand.]

SEC. 10. <u>Amendment</u>. Sections 11.28.080, 11.28.090 and 11.28.100 of the Wrangell Municipal Code are amended to read:

11.28.080 Blocking roadway prohibited.

It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any [motor or other] vehicle, whether the same is or is not attended or occupied by any person, to stop, stand, leave or park the same in such a manner or under such conditions as to leave available less than 10 feet of the width of the roadway for the free movement of vehicular traffic, except momentarily during the actual loading or unloading of passengers or merchandise and such stopping does not actually impede or obstruct such vehicular traffic, or unless in obedience to traffic regulations or traffic signs or signals, or to a police officer.

11.28.090 [Loading and unloading passengers]<u>Bus Stop and Passenger Zone</u>—Parking prohibited.

It is unlawful for the operator [or driver] of any [motor or other] vehicle to stop the same for a period of time longer than is actually necessary for the actual loading or unloading of passengers at any bus stop, or other place marked as a passenger zone, and the stop cannot interfere with a bus waiting to enter or about to enter the zone.

11.28.100 Loading and unloading materials.

It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any [motor or other] vehicle to stop, stand or park the same for a period of time longer than is actually necessary for the actual unloading and delivery or pickup and loading of material or merchandise in any place marked as a loading zone.

SEC.11. Repeal. Section 11.28.120 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is repealed:

11.28.120 [Use of parking meter zones by taxicabs]Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the driver or operator of a vehicle used as a taxicab to place, stand or park the same in front of any parking meter or in any parking meter area or zone unless such taxicab is occupied by a paying passenger, or unless waiting for the return of a paying passenger to reenter the taxicab, or unless waiting for a paying passenger who has called such taxicab.]

SEC. 12. <u>Amendment</u>. Sections 11.28.130 and 11.28.140 of the Wrangell Municipal Code are amended to read:

11.28.130 Method of parking – Loading permits.

Except when necessary in obedience to traffic regulations or traffic signs or signals, it shall be unlawful for the owner or operator of any [motor or other] vehicle, whether [same] it is or is not attended or occupied by any person, to stop, stand, leave or park the same in a roadway other than parallel with the curb or edge of the roadway, headed in the direction of traffic, with the curb side or edge of the roadway wheels more than 12 inches from the curb or edge of the roadway, or closer than three feet to any [motor or other] vehicle stopped or parked immediately in front thereof, excepting as provided in the following subsections:

. . .

11.28.140 Penalty for [overtime parking]<u>violation</u>.

[Any person, firm or corporation violating overtime parking provisions of this chapter or WMC 11.32.050, in addition to specific penalties therein prescribed, shall pay such fine not exceeding \$50.00 as the court shall, in its discretion, impose. The time for payment and method of payment of the penalty shall be prescribed by the court.] Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by a fine of up to \$500.00 if the offense is not listed in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule.

SEC. 13. <u>Amendment</u>. The list of sections in Chapter 11.30, Parking Lot Regulations, of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

11.32.040 [License – Fees] Repealed.

[The license fees for licensed vehicle and business stands shall be as follows:

- A. Taxi stands, \$5.00 per month or fraction of a month, for each 22 feet or fraction thereof, of the street used for a taxi stand;
- B. Bus stands, \$8.00 per month or fraction of a month, for each 35 feet or fraction thereof, of the street used for a bus stand;
- C. Other vehicle and business stands, \$5.00 per month or fraction of a month, for each 22 feet or fraction thereof, of the street used for such other vehicle stand.]
- 11.32.050 [Prohibited parking in licensed stand by others than licensee] Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the owner or operator of any motor or other vehicle, without the consent of the licensee, to leave, park, place or stop the same within the area, or any part thereof, of any licensed stand.]

11.32.060 [Unlawful standing of vehicles in licensed stand by licensee] Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the licensee of any licensed vehicle stand to stand, leave, place or park any motor or other vehicle at any licensed stand more than 12 inches away from the curb, or so as to extend beyond the boundaries of such stand; or to use or occupy such stand after expiration or revocation of such license; or at any other time when a valid license for such stand is not in effect.]

11.32.070 [Unlawful use of sidewalks for vehicle stand] Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the owner, proprietor or operator of any place within the borough occupied or used as a taxi, bus, truck, or other vehicle stand, whether or not such place is situated on any public street, highway, alley, or other public thoroughfare, to leave, place or park any automobile, bus, truck, or other vehicle thereon so that same or any part thereof extends onto or over any public sidewalk, street, alley, or other public thoroughfare, or any part thereof.]

11.32.080 [Crossing sidewalks for ingress and egress to stand] Repealed.

[It is unlawful for the owner, proprietor or operator of any place within the borough occupied or used as a taxi, bus, truck, or other vehicle stand, to use or occupy more than 10 feet of any public sidewalk as a driveway for ingress thereto or egress therefrom without

first applying for and obtaining a license so to do as provided in this chapter, and paying therefor a license fee of \$5.00 per month, or fraction of a month, in advance, for each 22 feet, or fraction thereof, of the sidewalk so used or occupied in excess of 10 feet.]

- 5. Within 100 feet of any school or hospital, unless traveling directly to or from it;

- 6. On or within 100 feet of any skating area or ice rink;
- 7. On the outdoor shooting range, borough playground, Volunteer Park ball fields, or Little League ball fields;
- 8. Within 75 feet of designated sledding areas. "Designated sledding area" is the entire south end of the multi-purpose field/running track. Snow machines shall not be operated 75 feet from top of the slope or 75 feet from bottom of the slope. Access for snow machines to the non-designated sledding area of the multi-purpose field/running track is provided on Second Street and Sales Street.
- B. Snow machines may be operated upon the streets and alleys of the borough, except areas from, and including, Front Street to the waterfront (Zimovia Straits), and if so operated:
 - 1. Are limited to traveling from one place to another on the most reasonable direct route possible and no person shall use the streets for recreational purposes;
 - 2. Shall be driven on the extreme right, in single file, and in accordance with all motor vehicle regulations;
 - 3. Shall not pass any other moving vehicle while going in the same direction upon borough streets;
 - 4. Shall yield right-of-way to all other motor vehicles.
- SEC. 27. New Section. Chapter 11.68 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to by the addition of a new Section 11.68.060 to read:

11.68.060 Penalty for Violation.

Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by a fine of up to \$500.00 if the offense is not listed in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule.

It is also unlawful for the owner, tenant or other person in possession or control of any property to cause or allow a junk vehicle to be placed or remain in public view on such property for more than 10 days.

C. Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by a fine of up to \$500.00 if the offense is not listed in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule.

11.76.030 Disposition of junk vehicles.

- A. Upon observation of what appears to be a junk vehicle, the [borough manager]Wrangell Police Department shall give written notice by personal service or certified mail to:
 - 1. Any or all offenders described in WMC <u>11.76.020(A)</u>; and
 - 2. Any or all lienholders of record, as well as notice affixed to the vehicle. Notice affixed to the vehicle shall suffice for subsequent action if none of the offenders described in WMC <u>11.76.020(A)</u> can be located and served within the 10-day period. This notice shall contain:
 - a. The street address and other information sufficient to identify the location of the vehicle;
 - b. A statement that the vehicle constitutes a public nuisance and a copy or summary of the relevant code sections;

- c. A statement that if the vehicle is not removed from public view within 10 days from issuance of the notice, the borough may impound and sell or destroy the vehicle at the offender's expense; and
- d. A statement that if the offender can show ability and willingness to make the repairs necessary to convert the junk vehicle into an operable vehicle, application may be made at any time before the 10 days have expired for a 30-day waiver to make the necessary repairs.
- SEC. 29. <u>Classification</u>. This ordinance is of a permanent nature and shall be codified in the Wrangell Municipal Code.
- SEC. 30. <u>Severability</u>. If any portion of this ordinance or any application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of this ordinance and the application to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.
- SEC. 31. Effective Date. This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption.

- SEC. 1. <u>Action</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend certain sections of Chapter 15.18, Garbage, of the Wrangell Municipal Code.

- [C. Each container shall be kept closed except when it becomes necessary to deposit or to remove refuse. Each container shall be kept clean and upright so as not to create an odor nuisance or endanger public health or safety.]
- [D. All borough-owned bulk storage containers shall be maintained and repaired by the borough.]
 - SEC. 5. New Section. Chapter 15.18 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended

by the addition of a new Section 15.18.032 to read:

15.18.032 Refuse containers – Maintained.

Each refuse container shall be kept closed except when it becomes necessary to deposit or to remove refuse. Containers shall not be overfilled as to allow animals or wildlife to access its contents. Each container shall be kept clean and upright so as not to create an odor nuisance or endanger public health or safety.

SEC. 6. <u>Amendment.</u> Section 15.18.050 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

15.18.050 [Disposal – Restricting generally] <u>Disposal of offensive refuse - prohibited.</u>

A. It is unlawful for any person to deposit refuse which may be offensive, noxious, or dangerous to the public health on any private property, public ground, alley, street, area, way, or on other public place within the borough limits where it may become dangerous or offensive to the public health.

[B. Outside burning of rubbish or other combustible materials shall be restricted to authorization or special permit of the fire chief.]

[C]B. Nothing contained in this chapter shall be construed to prevent a person from removing rubbish from his private property and transporting it to any approved disposal area; provided, that all borough regulations relating to the use of the disposal area are complied with; and provided further, that the private hauling shall not excuse said person from paying a refuse collection or disposal fee

SEC. 7. New Section. Chapter 15.18 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended by the addition of a new Section 15.18.052 to read:

15.18.052 [Disposal – Restricting generally]Burning of certain materials prohibited.

A. No person may cause or allow burning of materials which creates a danger to public health or safety or a public or private nuisance. No person may cause or allow the burning of rubber, plastic, tar, petroleum products, automobile parts, putrescible garbage, petroleum-treated products, oily waste, contaminated oil cleanup materials, or other materials in a way that produces black smoke or offensive smoke.

- B. Except as prohibited in this section, the outside burning of paper, cardboard, wood, and yard trimming materials is allowed in a burn barrel, homemade burn box, wood stove, outdoor boiler, or open pit.
- SEC. 8. <u>Amendment.</u> Section 15.18.110 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

15.18.110 Penalty for violation.

Any person violating any provision of this chapter is guilty of an infraction and shall be punished by the fine established in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule if the offense is listed in that fine schedule or by a fine of up to \$500.00 if the offense is not listed in the WMC 1.20.050 fine schedule. [Any person keeping refuse in containers other than authorized by this chapter, or who keeps upon any premises in the borough refuse which is offensive, or who fails to perform any act required by this chapter, shall have committed a violation which, upon conviction, is punishable by a fine not exceeding \$150.00 per violation.] A separate offense shall be deemed committed upon each day during or on which a violation occurs or continues after the violator has been given actual or constructive notice of violation.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA, AMENDING THE MINOR OFFENSE FINE SCHEDULE IN CHAPTER 1.20, GENERAL PENALTY, OF THE WRANGELL MUNICIPAL CODE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF WRANGELL, ALASKA:

- SEC. 1. <u>Action</u>. The purpose of this ordinance is to amend the Minor Offense Fine Schedule in Section 1.20.050 of Chapter 1.20, General Penalty, of the Wrangell Municipal Code to add to the fine schedule offenses relating to Chapter 9.16, Littering, Chapter 11.28, Stopping, Standing, and Parking, Chapter 11.30, Parking Lot Regulations, Chapter 11.36, Miscellaneous Traffic Rules, Chapter 11.64, Sound Trucks, Chapter 11.68, Snowmobiles, Chapter 11.76, Junk Vehicles, and Chapter 15.18, Garbage.
- SEC. 2. <u>Amendment.</u> Section 1.20.050 of the Wrangell Municipal Code is amended to read:

1.20.050 Minor Offense Fine Schedule.

In accordance with AS 29.25.070(a), citations for the following offenses may be disposed of as provided in AS 12.25.195-.230, without a court appearance, upon payment of the fine amounts listed below plus the state surcharge required by AS 12.55.039 and AS 29.25.074. Fines must be paid to the police department. If an offense is not listed on a fine schedule, the defendant must appear in court to answer the charges. The Alaska Court System's Rules of Minor Offense Procedure apply to all offenses listed below. Citations charging these offenses must meet the requirements of Minor Offense Rule 3. If a person charged with one of these offenses appears in court and is found guilty, the penalty imposed for the offense may not exceed the fine amount for that offense listed below.

The fine amounts listed below are doubled for motor vehicle or traffic offenses committed in a highway work zone or traffic safety corridor, as those terms are defined in AS 28.90.990 and 13 AAC 40.010(b).

An offense listed in this schedule may not be disposed of without court appearance if the offense is in connection with a motor vehicle accident that results in the death of a person.

Summary

Performs routine and recurring clerical duties specific to Library operations and the provision of patron services. Duties may relate to processing, and circulation of library materials, and responding to routine requests for information and assistance.

Distinguishing Career Features

The Library Assistant I is the first in a multi-level career path for Library media services. The Library Assistant I provides circulation and customer service support. Advancement to Library Assistant II is possible by additional responsibility for team leadership, and competency in customer service for circulation, reference, and inter-library lending.

Essential Duties and Responsibilities

- Assists patrons with finding library materials. Helps patrons use resource searches and library materials to locate information of interest.
- Charges out and checks in library materials. Collects service charges on overdue, lost, or damaged materials. Types overdue notices and similar short forms.
- Sorts and files books and uses the automation system. Maintains routine files related to library operations. Accepts applications for library cards.
- Prepares books and other materials for circulation. Applies labels, pocketsbar codes, and plastic covers to books, and audiovisual materials and bar codes.
- Shelves and re-shelves books into proper alpha or numeric category.
- Checks in periodicals received by the Library. Discards periodicals according to instructions. Displays or files periodicals as appropriate.
- May e<u>C</u>atalogs pre-classified books and other library materials by obtaining the correct bibliographic record on-line from a computer database.
- Performs clerical tasks such as data entry into to pre-established databases using data entry screens, and processing reports on items such as books that are missing, replaced, transferred, or discarded.
- Processes interlibrary loan requests through the OCLC database.
- Mail duties; prepares books and other items to mail back to other loaning libraries.
- Assists other staff with preparation for and presentation of children's programming. <u>Assists</u> students during the summer reading program.

- Participates in library beautification efforts such as but not limited to displays, placing and aligning materials on shelves, furniture arrangements and cleanliness, and appearance of entry ways.
- Performs other duties as assigned that support the overall objective of the position.

Qualifications

Knowledge and Skills

Requires basic knowledge of library clerical procedures and basic familiarity with reference tools and sources including use of automated library card catalogs. Requires a basic understanding of the Dewey Decimal System of classification and the American Library Association rules for filing. Requires sufficient human relations skill to exercise patience and deal courteously with patrons of all ages. Requires sufficient math skill to compute sums, products, quotients, and percents. Requires sufficient writing skills to compose routine memos and announcements.

Abilities

Requires ability to perform all the duties of the position and to follow detailed procedures such as library filing rules. Requires the ability to work with a diverse customer population of all ages. Requires the ability to work as contributing member of a team, work productively and cooperatively with other teams and external customers, and convey a positive image of the City and its services. Requires the ability to learn library filing systems. Must be able to learn to perform transactions within an automated library system. Required to work Saturdays and one evening per week. May be required to work evenings and weekends.

Physical Abilities

Incumbent must be able to function indoors in an office and/or library circulation desk environment engaged in work primarily of a moderately active nature. Requires ability to converse with patrons, provide accurate information, and communicate effectively with small groups. Requires hearing and speech ability for ordinary conversation and to project voice to a small group. Requires ability to operate a computer, mobile devices, and other office equipment. sufficient manual and/or finger dexterity to type/keyboard and otherwise operate microcomputers and other office equipment. This position Requires the employee to move about inside the office to access filing cabinets, bookshelves, computers, and check-out desk. Will occasionally ascend/descend stairs and move equipment weighing up to 50 pounds. ambulatory ability to sit, walk, to move about office environs, and to lift and carry light to medium weight materials on an intermittent basis.

Education and Experience

The position requires a High school diploma plus one year of experience in a library, educational support setting, or equivalent in customer service. College-level courses and/or a certificate in library science is preferred and may substitute for some experience. Competency in a second language is desired.

Licenses and Certificates

May require a valid driver's license.

Working Conditions

Work is performed indoors with minimal exposure to health and safety hazards.
