Why relocate freight?

- Aging downtown ramp unsafe, decommissioned in 2025
- Tourism conflicts freight + cruise ships = congestion
 & safety issues
- Community vision relocation recommended in multiple plans & surveys
- Right site 40-acre Mill property offers deep water, industrial fit
- MSC not viable costly upgrades, disrupts existing marine industries

Alternatives Considered

- Marine Service Center (too costly, safety conflicts with cul-de-sac)
- Ballard's (property/road issues/capital)
- Airport Rock Pit (FAA/tidal issues/site control)
- Rebuild downtown facility (blocks redevelopment, continued use of cul-de-sac)

→ 6-Mile Mill Site is the best long-term solution.







The MOU with Alaska Marine Lines



Setting the Stage

- Builds on years of community planning, surveys, and waterfront studies
- Responds to the decommissioning of the aging downtown facility

Building the Relationship

- Establishes a non-binding framework for collaboration
- Combines CBW's access to public funding & authority with AML's expertise & investment

Continuity in Vision

- Plan, design, and develop a new barge landing at the 6-Mile Mill Site
- Definitive agreement by Dec 31, 2025
- Design and construction targeted for 2026–2027

Roles & Responsibilities

City & Borough of Wrangell

- Provide property access
- Secure permits, funding, utilities
- •Lead community engagement

Alaska Marine Lines

- •Define operational needs
- Participate in design & investment
- •Commit to relocation once facility built






Benefits to the Community

- Reliable, modern freight services
- Opens downtown waterfront for community uses & tourism development
- Expands industrial opportunities at 6-Mile site
- Safer separation of freight and visitor activity
- Foundation for public-private partnership leveraging federal/state grants







Community Considerations

- Businesses concerned about higher freight
 & transportation costs from the new location
- Road impacts and transportation routes are a key issue for businesses and residents
- Need for cost-sharing strategies and exploration of funding to offset impacts
- Ongoing dialogue with AML, DOT, and stakeholders to ensure solutions align with business needs
- Goal: relocation that strengthens
 Wrangell's economy without creating undue burden on local businesses

Next Steps

- Design & engineering studies continue technical work
- Economic analysis evaluate business impacts, freight costs, and road use
- Stakeholder engagement keep community informed & involved
- 4. Definitive agreement target completion by end of 2025
- 5. Construction begin 2026–2027
